#0523.01: Walk to School Week 2023



Walk to School Week takes place every year. This year's theme is Walk with Wildlife. The event is organised by Living Streets, who began life as the Pedestrians Association ninety years ago! https://www.livingstreets.org.uk/about-us/our-history



This five-day walking challenge is a celebration of the walk to school and the perfect activity to run as part of National Walking Month this May.

This fun and engaging week-long activity for primary schools has been built to make pupils experience first-hand the importance of walking to school. Through this challenge, children will be well on their way to reaching their recommended 60 minutes minimum of physical activity per day before even reaching the school gates!

A classroom pack of activities is available and priced at £12.50 for Key Stage 1 and 2. This can be ordered from the Living Streets website and any orders placed before the 9th May will arrive in time for the week itself, which runs from 15th to 19th May.

#0523.04: Primary Geography Subject Leader Online Network Meeting

The final of Emma Espley's regular Primary Geography Subject Leader meetings for this academic year takes place on Thursday 25th May, from 9am until 11.45am.

The focus will be on revisiting **Ofsted's Education Inspection Framework (EIF)**, focusing on one of its three **Is** in more depth (**impact**).

When contemplating the notion of curriculum making, the interconnectedness of intent, implementation and impact must remain paramount. The meeting will begin by considering a number of key questions relating to impact

e.g.

How do geographical knowledge and skills prepare all pupils for the next stage of education? What do pupil outcomes tell us about the appropriateness of the curriculum intent?

To what extent have pupils progressed towards curriculum 'goals' and evidenced what they can remember about the content studied?

Inspectors are no longer using internal data to assess the attainment and progress of pupils. Instead, there is a greater focus on **first-hand evidence** gathered from **interviews**, **learning walks**, **lesson observations and book scrutinies**. These will be discussed in turn, integrating a **practical activity** too.

The second part of the meeting will focus on assessment and progression in geography. An overview will be provided, with the aim of looking at these aspects in more depth during the first meeting of the next academic year. Time will be built in to explore some of the recommended websites and resources as well.

The meeting will conclude with a period of reflection; time to formulate an action plan for the remainder of Terms 5 and 6 and the academic year ahead.

Throughout the morning, there will be **opportunities to interact with others** through various activities and open discussions, as well as the **chance to ask** any **questions** that you may have. It is hoped that you will feel **well-versed to reflect upon your whole school geography curriculum offering and confident about discussing this with an Ofsted inspector, member of SLT, school's Governing Body, etc. should you be required to do so.**

#0523.05: Young Geographer of the Year Competition 2023



This is an annual competition organised by the Royal Geographical Society (with IBG). The theme of this year's competition is 'A blueprint for the future'. The RGS are looking for innovative ideas to address problems in areas such as food production and supply, energy and sustainability, water security, resources, population growth, economic stability and environmental management. The competition has four age categories, which includes one for Key Stage 2 (pupils aged 7-11). Entry is in the form of an A3 poster, which should focus on possible solutions to one of the world's problems. Details here:



There have been a great many reads for primary-aged students released in recent months. This is a 'golden age' for such literature in many respects. This picture book focuses on a theme which is common to many of these books: the impact of people on the environment over time.



'The Tree and the River' is the latest offering from Aaron Becker. A mighty tree stands on the banks of a winding river, bearing silent witness to the flow of time and change. A family farms the fertile valley. Soon, a village sprouts, and not long after, a town. Residents learn to harness the water, the wind, and the animals in order to survive and thrive. The growing population becomes begins to bend nature to their will and ambition. What will happen to the tree? The pictures tell the whole story and will provoke discussion.
